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What Do You Know?

Too soon old, too late smart; is a favorite saying of my friend George. When I first heard it, I laughed along with everyone else. Now two decades later, the realization of its truthfulness is settling in.

In my high school classroom, I remember attempting to illustrate the enormity of information in our world and our relationship with it all. Students were told to imagine the markerboard in the front of the room could represent everything possible that can be known about anything.

I then drew a small dot off to the side and said, "That's how much I know." Snickers rippled across the room. Until I drew an even smaller dot near to the first one and said, "And that's how much you know."

In May, I traveled with **Under The Fig Tree** to Egypt, Jordan and Israel. And recently I returned from a two-week study in **Asia Minor** *(modern day Turkey)* where I tried to gain a better understand of the Newer Testament. Specifically, the books from John to Revelation. Within days, my dot had shrunk. The daughter of a pastor, I thought I knew the Bible. Our family played a Ten Commandments board game, Bible trivia, and would memorize verses. I could even answer questions from The American Bible Challenge game show.

But, the reality of what the historical, geographical, and cultural context reveals throughout the Text, makes me feel I am opening the Bible for the first time. A believer for most of my life, how do I know so little?

I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you.

John 15:15

When we don't know what we don't know, we end up thinking that we know. I have become increasingly aware I should talk less and let those who *really* know *(not just think they do)* impart their wisdom. Jesus does not know the day or the hour the Father is planning for His



Some of the most memorable experiences in the lands of the Bible occur when a teaching unfolds before your eyes. As we were hiking toward the acropolis of Sardis, we entered a vineyard and the lesson of John 15 began. Our leader, Brad Gray, described the vine (*Jesus*), the branches (*us*), the incredible fruit, and the need for the Gardener (*God*, the Father).

The grapes in the vineyard were gorgeous and only grew that way because they were attached to the vine. It was the connectedness of the branch that gave life to the fruit. The vine (*Jesus*) does not bear the fruit, it is the skinny little branch (*us*) that does. However, if left alone and detached, the branch would produce nothing.

Sometimes the vinedresser lifts the vine to keep it from expending needless energy putting down roots in random places or picking up a fungus. And at other times life-depleting branches and leaves must be cut away to let the sunlight in. As the sun reaches the fruit and the branch remains connected to the vine, the fruit the Lord designed for us to bear becomes more luscious than we could imagine.

Our group of 35, stood among the rows of beautiful green grapes ready for harvest. We probably weren't supposed to eat them, but I plucked a single grape off a bunch and was amazed at the sweetness! I have never tasted a grape like that before.

About thirty minutes in, we saw the vinedresser approaching knife in hand. How he would react to a bunch of foreigners in the middle of his vineyard? To our surprise, he took his knife and began to cut off clusters of grapes to give a large bunch to each of us. He joyfully lavished on us the unexpected. This is just like our God. While we savor our one grape, the Lord desires to give us so much more.
